- **Study** Spend time in God's Word to help you get closer to God. This might be adding a daily devotion or just reading Scripture for 10 minutes a day. Be sure your new routine is manageable so that you can do it consistently throughout Lent.

FROM PASTOR MARC'S DESK

May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace in believing, so that by the power of the Holy Spirit you may abound in hope. Romans 15:13

Praise be to the God of Hope! - The God of hope has looked on His people here at St Paul's with love and grace. The God of hope has done so for my family and I also. Andrea and I have been praying and seeking what was next for us and for me as a shepherd. We trusted in God and He has provided. The God of hope has been faithful to all of us! I am humbled to have been installed as Lead Pastor on December 3rd. I would like to thank Marco Van Raalten and the search committee. God was involved through the search process and that was evident. Thank you also to Pastor Terry Schoenfeld for his counsel and pastoral encouragement. Thank you, St. Paul's church, elders, and deacons, for welcoming me and my family. I am grateful for Todd Brooks and the EFCA central district for their ongoing support. Join me as I praise and thank the God of hope for His grace and faithfulness.

Hope when we are hopeless - My first sermon series was an Advent sermon series on Hope. As I was studying God's word, I was struck by how God's message of hope was when God's people were faced with hopeless situations. This is how God works. As I have talked with many of you, I have learned that St. Paul's has been through a season of hopelessness. God's word has shown us that with God all things are possible. Abraham kept hoping when there was no reason to hope (Romans 4:18). The angel Gabriel told Mary when she was a virgin that she would give birth to Jesus. The angel said, "Nothing is impossible with God" (Luke 1:37). While we were sinners, Christ died for us (Romans 5:8). Our God is gracious. His hand has provided even though we do not deserve it. So, we humble ourselves before him and God fills us with joy and peace. We then will abound in hope. God has brought St. Paul's through a difficult season and has filled our church with hope that will overflow. What does this mean? We will continue to hope for what's next expecting God to work through us. This is not hope in our strength but through the power of the Holy Spirit.

Great Commission and Great Commandment - St. Paul's leadership desires to be a Great Commission and Great Commandment church. This is our AIM (Abide, In pursuit, Mission). We abide in the Vine because we know apart from Him, we can do nothing (John 15:4). We cannot play our part in God's mission without the God of the mission. We will abide in the whole counsel of God's word and in prayer both individually and corporately. We are in pursuit together to love one another. We know we have "passed from death to life" by how we love one another (1 John 3:14). So let us love one another on Sundays and throughout the week. Our mission is to make disciples of all nations, and we do this by showing and sharing the love of Jesus. We will look for ways to continue to participate in God's mission of love toward our neighbors, city and the world.

Connecting People in Community - How are we connecting people to community? This could be people who have never been a part of St. Paul's or people who have been disconnected recently from our church. Let us pray and be intentional with how God will use us to connect people to our church community. This could be inviting people to an event like the Sausage Supper or to JAM (Jesus and Me) Wednesday night kids' program. This could be inviting people to church on Sunday morning or inviting them to your bible study. Let us be intentional with how we are sharing the love of Jesus with those who need community and love.

God's call is a gift - I want to finish and say it is a gift of God's grace to be called to be your shepherd at St. Paul's Evangelical Free Church. I am here to be a shepherd and to live life with you all. It is a gift for Andrea, Joelle and Margot as well. My family looks forward to building relationships with our church family. Let us follow Jesus together humbly and at the right time He will lift us up (1 Peter 5:6).
